Matthew is enrolled in the Comprehensive Music Program for Young People in The Filomen M. D'Agostino Greenberg Music School at The Lighthouse International in New York City. The Lighthouse doesn't usually accept such young students, but in Matthew, they have seen something exceptional. He started playing the piano at age 5, the drums at 7, and the bass guitar just three months ago. At the Lighthouse, Matthew studies these instruments, as well as Braille music, other percussion instruments, music theory, and dance. He's also

participated in several performathons, and spring and fall concerts. On October 8, 2009, Matthew was the youngest member to perform with the Lighthouse Jazz Ensemble in a concert called "A Vision of Jazz" celebrating World Sight Day. 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NEWS FROM NATIONAL.

Exciting initiatives are going on on the national scene that will address some of the very real issues that face blind children and their families today.

- First up the shortage of teachers of the blind. The National Federation of the Blind (NFB) has launched a major recruiting effort to interest potential teachers in the field of teaching blind/visually impaired students. If you would like to become a part of this effort, or know someone who would like to become involved, contact us at blindchildren@verizon.net.
- Next, research has shown that many partially sighted students do not receive the opportunity to attain full literacy skills, due to incorrect identification of their literacy needs. A major part of the problem is due to fundamental problems with the assessments currently in use.

In response to this serious situation, the NFB, the National Organization of Parents of Blind Children (NOPBC), and a panel of researchers and teachers of the blind from across the country have created a new assessment tool which is currently being piloted. If you would like your partially sighted child to participate in the pilot study or if you are a teacher of the blind and would like to try out the new assessment tool, contact us at blindchildren@verizon.net.

Last, but not least, in an effort to gain information that will be of real use in the education and development of blind/VI children, the NFB Jernigan Institute convened a panel of researchers, teachers of the blind, and parent leaders to discuss the direction of research on Braille. Our first event, sponsored by NFBJI, the National Center for Severe and Sensory Disabilities (NCSSD), and the Bresnahan-Halstead Center on Disabilities, will be "Research in the Rockies," a research summit on braille reading and writing that will take place in June in Denver.

COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE

Applications are now being accepted for the 2010 NFB Scholarship Program. Thirty scholarships totaling \$100,000 will be awarded to blind college and graduate students from the U.S. and Puerto Rico. The annual youth and adult writing contests sponsored by the Writers' Division of the NFB are open January 1 to April 1, 2010. Adult poetry and fiction contests are open to all entrants 18 years and over. Youth poetry and fiction entries will be divided into three categories: first through sixth grades, seventh and eighth grades, and ninth through twelfth grades. NEWS FROM CBVI..

The 2009-2010 school year is in full swing. During October's "Blindness Awareness Month," the Education Unit at the Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired hosted three teacher workshops at the Parsippany Hilton, the Conference Center at Mercer, and the Mount Laurel Marriott. More than 200 teacher and therapists from public and private schools in all of New Jersey's 21 counties attended. Many attendees were teachers who have a blind or visually impaired student in their class for the first time. Special thanks to the education staff at each regional office, the Meyer Center, the Orientation and Mobility staff, the VR College/Transition staff, student Shafeka Hashash of New Milford as the keynote speaker at the Northern Region conference, and Dr. and Mrs. Dharmesh Doshi of Belle Mead, parents of Mihir Doshi and keynote speakers at the Central Region conference.

The Meyer Center is sponsoring a "Netbook" pilot project in 2009-2010. In August 2009, 10 high school students throughout the state received a Netbook with software applications such as JAWS and Microsoft Office, a scanner, a braille display, a CD drive and a backpack. Students are receiving instruction on how to use the Netbook and will be giving the Commission feedback about their experiences. The Netbook is a fraction of the cost of a BrailleNote, and much more versatile. We await feedback!

Lastly, the Commission has received Education IDEA-ARRA funds, which it plans to use to increase Braille production, provide training to teachers, parents and teacher-aides, and purchase additional technology for students.

Summer Program 2009 : Accessing Opportunities

Summer 2009 was great fun for many New Jersey children who are blind or visually impaired and their families who participated in Accessing Opportunities, the Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired's summer program. This summer program was developed for children to provide experiences in the areas of recreation, independence, socialization, and instruction. The theme for this year's summer program was Accessing Opportunities as it provided opportunities for children to experience and acquire new skills.

The summer events were held throughout the state of New Jersey, and transportation was provided for families. During the events, students rode and groomed horses, participated in wall climbing, team building, swimming, boating, fishing, archery, baseball, basketball, tennis, segway riding, dancing, and much, much more. Parents were also included in all of the fun, and many parents learned some new dance steps. The events were held at Camp Ockanickon (Physical Education Day), East Brunswick Hilton (Dance Party Workshop), Trenton Thunder Baseball Game, and Black Bear Resort (Family Fun Day). New friendships between both children and parents were developed, and old friends were able to have fun together.

Did you know...

The NJ Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired is celebrating its **100th anniversary** in 2010.

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Many parents and teachers have expressed concern regarding **CBVI services for children ages birth to three.** Following is the official CBVI policy for children in this age group:

"Early Intervention clients, ages birth to 3, will be seen by education staff at a minimum of twice each year and may be seen more often based upon need, to be determined by the assigned instructor and supervisor. In a year, the maximum number of visits is not to exceed eight.

"These simple guidelines allow for flexibility and are based on the need of the consumer and their family."

A year ago this month, POBC-NJ announced in these pages that Camp Marcella was no more. For 50 years, the NJ CBVI had leased the camp for \$1 a year from the NJ Camp for Blind Children, and provided a summer camp experience for blind and visually impaired children throughout the state.

In response to that article, we received a letter from the president of the camp board, informing us that Camp Marcella would still be operating, but that it would be run by Easter Seals. Through several telephone conversations and a meeting with members of the camp board and Easter Seals personnel, we learned that significant changes would be taking place:

- They were planning to serve 90 children a week (this was later revised to from 50 to 60).
- Certain weeks would be set aside for blind/VI children; the rest of the weeks would be for children with multiple disabilities (not blind/VI), the children that Easter Seals traditionally serves.
- They were opening up camp to children and adults from other states.
- There would be a tuition cost to the family of approximately \$1000 for a 6-day session and \$2000 for a 12-day session.

Needless to say, many parents were disturbed to hear these developments. In the end, very few blind/VI children attended the program. Our understanding is that Easter Seals will not be running the program next summer and that the camp board and the Commission might be returning to the negotiating table. We will keep you informed as we hear any new information.
